













































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































































As circumstances change, households may find themselves below or above the ALICE Threshold at different times. While the COVID-19 pandemic brought employment shifts, health struggles, and school/business closures in 2021, it also spurred unprecedented public assistance through pandemic relief measures. In 2019, 39,995 households in Winnebago County were below the ALICE Threshold; in 2021 this number changed to 47,728, (a 19% change).












